IT'S ONLY MONEY

There's no question that it's easy to become attached to money. We like the comfort it brings us. The luxuries. The future security. I believe that if we're not careful we can begin trusting in money to do the things that God says He'll do for us. And when we get to that point we start making compromises in order to get more money. Your tax preparer asks you a question, and the truthful answer is "yes". But you know that if you say yes you'll have to pay more taxes. So you hesitate . . . will you do what God says? "Therefore each of you must put off falsehood and speak truthfully to his neighbor" (Ephesians 4:25). Or will you do what will get you more money? Your poor neighbor whom you have known for years tells you he's in a tight spot and needs some financial help. God has so blessed you that it is in your power to help him. Do you? Or do you lie and tell him you just can't right now? Or let's say the neighbor kid comes by and offers to shovel your snow for \$20 and you agree. So he does, and then comes up to your door to get paid. Do you give him the \$20? Or do you criticize his work and decide it's only worth \$10? Come on, the kid is twelve! Give him his money!

God knows what is in all of our hearts. He knows the motivation behind every thought. If we cheat people and lie to people for money those things will come to the Lord's attention. "Look! The wages you failed to pay the workmen who mowed your fields are crying out against you. The cries of the harvesters have reached the ears of the Lord Almighty" (James 5:4). Money is not worth displeasing the Lord. So I would encourage us on to not be motivated by money. For money we will work hard, but for the Lord we should work even harder. "Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for men, since you know that you will receive an inheritance from the Lord as a reward. It is the Lord Christ you are serving" (Colossians 3:23-24). Remember: the reward of the Lord is SO much better than money.

A SEAT IN THE LIFEBOAT



CALL TO WORSHIP

A severe potato famine in the nineteenth century motivated many Irish to come to the New World to find new opportunities.

One little boy who did not have money for fare to board a ship to the New World secretly boarded as a stow-away. The ship eventually hit an iceberg and began to sink. Passengers filled lifeboats to escape to safety. At first the boy, who had been hiding in the hull of the ship, was not aware of what was going on. When he realized what was happening, he rushed up to the deck and saw the captain taking the last seat in the last lifeboat. In the highest tradition of the sea, the captain got out of the lifeboat and gave the boy his seat. As the lifeboat pulled away the captain said to the boy, "Never forget what's been done for you."

The boy became successful in the New World and was asked the secret of his motivation. He said, "Whenever I begin to doubt myself or let up from what I ought to be doing, I always remember the captain standing on the deck and saying, " Never forget what's been done for you."

You and I are much like that little boy. All of us have sinned and fall short of the glory of God and the "ship" onto which we have boarded is sinking, headed for destruction (Romans 3:23; 6:23). Noticing our plight, the "Captain" of the Universe—Jesus Christ, the Son of God—willingly and lovingly gave His life that we might be saved (1 Thessalonians 5:10). Because of His death on the cross, we can be saved from our sins when we place our trust in Him (Hebrews 11:6), repent of our sin (2 Corinthians 7:9-10), confess Jesus before men (Romans 10:9-10), and are baptized (immersed) into Christ for the forgiveness of our sins (Acts 2:38; cf. Mark 16:15-16; Acts 22:16; Romans 6:3-4; Galatians 3:27; 1 Peter 3:21).

The call from the cross of Calvary upon which Jesus died is, "Never forget what's been done for you." May each of us gratefully respond to that wonderful gift by submitting our lives to the One who died for us.
